Families Must Pray for Vocations

Aren't good families the first and best adapted gardens where vocations blossom naturally? Indeed, if we were to ask the priests and religious to whom, after God, do they owe their vocation, the greater part of them would no doubt point to the examples and lessons of a father full of faith and manly virtue, a mother, chaste and pious, and a family in which, with purity of moral life, charity for God and neighbor reigned supreme. There are few exceptions to this ordinary rule of Providence, and such exceptions only confirm the rule.

We must pray for vocations, it is the order of the Divine Master: "And He said to them: The harvest indeed is great, but the laborers are few. Pray ye therefore the Lord of the harvest, that He send labourers into his harvest." (Lk 10:2). But, as St Pius X rightly wrote, "if it is true that a vocation comes from God, it is no less certain also that God deigns to use secondary causes to realize the designs of His eternal wisdom" (Letter of May 7, 1907).

The Example of the Mothers of Lu

In a period of great faith, it was the custom for parents to beg God to deign to

call of their children. The well-known story of the mothers of Lu Monferrato, near Turin, in Italy, is a model of this deeply Catholic prayer of deeply Catholic parents who saw further than the good of their own selves and family. Under the direction of their parish priest, Msgr. Alessandro Canora, they gathered every Tuesday for adoration of the Blessed Sacrament, asking the Lord for vocations. They received Holy Communion on the first Sunday of every month with the same intention. After Mass, all the mothers prayed a particular prayer together imploring for vocations to the priesthood.

"O God, grant that one of my sons becomes a priest! I promise to live as a good Christian woman and will lead my children to all that is good, wherewith I hope to receive the grace to be able to give to Thee, O God, a holy priest."

Through the trusting prayer of these mothers and the openness of the other parents, an atmosphere of deep joy and Christian piety developed in the families, making it much easier for the children to recognize their vocations.

In fifty years, the prayers of these mothers have won at least five hundred priestly and religious vocations from out of the relatively small village of about 3000. But, remember, it was only in the town of Lu that for those fifty years, the good women were assisting together at the First Sunday Mass specifically for the intention of religious vocations!

The World vs. Vocations

We have to recognize, on the contrary, that often — too often alas! - parents, even among those who count it

glory to be sincerely Catholic, do not seem to be able to resign themselves to the priestly or religious vocation of their children, and do not scruple themselves to combat this divine call by every kind of argument, even at the risk of imperiling the conscience and eternal salvation of those souls who, nevertheless, ought to be so dear to them. Pope Pius XI wrote these strong words on this subject:

The lack of vocations in families of the middle and upper classes may be partly explained by the dissipations of modern life, the seductions, which especially in the larger cities, prematurely awaken the passions of youth; the schools in many places which scarcely conduce to the development of vocations. Nevertheless, it must be admitted that such a scarcity reveals a deplorable falling off of faith in the families themselves. Did they indeed look at things in the light of faith, what greater dignity could Christian parents desire for their sons, what ministry more noble, than that which, as We have said, is worthy of the veneration of men and angels? A long and sad experience has shown that a vocation betrayed -- the word is not to be thought too strong -- is a source of tears not only for the sons but also for the ill-advised parents; and God grant that such tears be not so long delayed as to become eternal tears. (Ad Catholici sacerdotii, 1935).

What would he say today with the legalisation of contraception, of abortion, of the arrival of TV and internet (with their impurities) in practically every home? How can impure children ever dream of virginity, of chastity, of celibacy?

No Children—No Vocations

In order to have vocations in a family, it presupposes in the first place to have children! No children, no vocation, that is an obvious and tragic reality. Moreover, when a family voluntarily limits the number of their children to one or two, that eliminates Don Bosco's rule of thumb that in a good family, there is one vocation for about every three children.

And what responsibility for selfish fathers and mothers when the day of the frightening judgment will come! What to answer then to the Divine Judge, for whom nothing is hidden, when one has willfully either blocked a vocation (in the style of, 'No, you will not go to this foreign monastery!'), or worse, prevented them from coming into the world? Kyrie, eleison! "Not everyone that saith to Me, 'Lord, Lord', shall enter into the kingdom of heaven: but he that doth the will of My Father who is in heaven, he shall enter into the kingdom of heaven." (Mt 7:21)

Love Children—Love Vocations

The first step then for the solution of the crisis in vocation is for parents to welcome children in their home, many of them!

Then, the whole family atmosphere of virtue, prayer, good example, of speaking highly of the gift of vocation, the reading of the lives of the Saints, all these elements foster the rise of true and generous vocations.

What father would not rejoice indeed, walking in a church, to see his son at the altar, holding in his hands the Divine Victim, knowing very well that at every mass, that priestly son prays and will ever pray for his cherished parents still alive or deceased?


Let us pray for families! They hold the key to the shortage of vocations!

Extract From A Spiritual Conference by Archbishop Marcel Lefebvre

When Fesquet [a journalist] of *Le Monde*—he was there in the second row two or three days ago—said: "But in fact you are alone. Alone against all the bishops. What on earth can you do? What sense is there in combat of that sort?"

I answered: "What do you mean? I am not alone, I have the whole of Tradition with me. Besides, even here I am not alone. I know that many bishops privately think as we do. We have many priests with us, and there are the seminary and the seminarians and all those who come our way.

And Truth is not made by numbers: numbers do not make Truth. Even if I am alone, and even if all my seminarians leave me, even if I am abandoned by the whole of public opinion, it is all the same to me. I am attached to my catechism, attached to my Credo, attached to the Tradition which sanctified all the saints in heaven. I am not concerned about others: they do as they wish; but I want to save my soul. Public opinion I know too well: it was public opinion which condemned Our Lord after acclaiming Him a few days before. First, Palm Sunday: then, Good Friday. We know that. Public opinion is not to be trusted at all. Today it is for me, tomorrow it is against me. What matters is fidelity to our Faith. We should have that conviction and stay calm."

At this point Lord Chancellor Audley broke in to dispute his argument. How could More, alone, presume to challenge so stubbornly what "all the bishops, universities, and best learned of this realm" had agreed to support?"

The response More now gave was one he had made several times before, but never with such rhetorical and dramatic force.

"If the number of bishops and universities should be so material as your lordship seems to think, then I see little cause, my lord, why that should make any change in my conscience. For I have no doubt that, though not in this realm, but of all those well learned bishops and virtuous men that are yet alive throughout Christendom, they are not fewer who are of my mind therein. But if I should speak of those who are already dead, of whom many are now holy saints in heaven, I am very sure it is the far greater part of them who, all the while they lived, thought in this case the way that I think now. And therefore am I not bound, my lord, to conform my conscience to the council of one realm against the General Council of Christendom."

Filipina Oblate Sisters in Kenya

THE NEW CONGREGATION OF THE MISSIONARY SISTERS OF JESUS AND MARY

Inception

The need of an SSPX congregation of sisters with an active missionary life must have impressed itself on the mind of His Excellency Bishop Bernard Fellay, Superior General of the SSPX, for sometime, but "How, Where, When and Who?" remained unsolved questions until after many prayers, much reflection and divine enlightenment. Fr. Marc Vernoy, former District Superior of the SSPX in Africa, was instrumental in what has happened. Divine Providence wished that the realization of this plan would take place in Kenya, Africa, in March 2011 when the necessary instruments were ready: candidates, a chaplain, sisters that would take care of the candidates' formation and a proper house with a chapel.

The First Community

So far six Oblate Sisters have happily

crossed the threshold of Our Lady of Angels House, four of which have come from the Philippines. The official presence of the Oblates in this beautiful safari country began on 11th September 2009 when Sister Maria Josepha, along with two Kenyan Sisters, formed the first community of the Oblate Sisters of the SSPX in Karen, Nairobi, occupying the same house left by the SSPX priests who had recently moved to Lavington, a 20 minute drive from Karen. Soon a Kenyan and four Nigerian ladies joined the new community asking to be trained as future Missionary Sisters. The Oblates immediately started the work assigned to them of giving preliminary training to the future Missionary Sisters. Then, in August 2010, they were joined by a French candidate who had previously received a year of training as a postulant at the Oblate Sisters' Novitiate in Salvan, Switzerland. Bishop Fellay had in fact advised her to

undertake this training until such time as the foundation of the envisaged congregation took place. On 19th March 2011 she became the first Novice of the Missionary Sisters of Jesus and Mary, and so Our Lady of Angels Novitiate was born.

Oblates from the Philippines

In September 2010, just after her Perpetual Oblation, Sister Maria Philomena from the House of Bethany, Philippines, was transferred to Kenya in order to help at Our Lady of Angels House. The following March (2011) two other transfers took place: Sister Maria Josepha was sent to the House of Bethany, while Sister Maria Concepcion, then at the House of Bethany, was sent to Our Lady of Angels House. With the newly founded congregation operational, more help was needed. So in July 2011, another Oblate Sister from the House of Bethany, Sister Maria Remedios, joined the community in Karen. At present there are four Oblate Sisters in Karen—a Kenyan, and three Filipinas—these last have adjusted themselves well to the Kenyan lifestyle as well as to the pleasant perpetual spring-like climate of Nairobi which is so different to their hot and humid Filipino archipelago. Within the community, however, they continue to live the life they have learned from their novitiate in Switzerland— a life imbued with the SSPX spirit.

Our Chaplain

The chaplain, Father Philippe Pazat, SSPX, is of great assistance to the novitiate in ways which are not just spiritual. He teaches Catechism, Liturgy, Apologetics, Spirituality, Church History and Crisis of the Church, through which he transmits much of the spirit received from the

direct contact he had with Archbishop Lefebvre. He also offers the community weekly spiritual conferences as well as giving spiritual direction to some novices while watching over the safety of the whole novitiate with paternal eyes. The community also appreciate his handyman skills in carpentry, electronics, landscaping and in many others. In fact, interested Sisters and novices are now learning these skills from him.

Daily Life at Our Lady of the Angels Novitiate

Divine Providence, through our superiors, has entrusted the initial formation of the novices and postulants, as well as the running of Our Lady of Angels House, to Sister Maria Concepcion. Sister gives lessons to the candidates on the Religious Life and the Vows, Gregorian Chant, English, Latin and other principles essential to the novitiate.

Sister Maria Philomena, besides being the house bursar, is also in charge of running some errands and flower arrangements. For over a year she helped at the Holy Cross Parish in Lavington teaching catechism and giving some lessons in Maths and English to little children at the weekends.

Sister Rose Mary, a Kenyan, helps in the kitchen, and also with the sewing, gardening, caring for the animals and, until December 2011, she too gave catechism classes in Lavington. She still teaches catechism to some souls in the neighborhood in Swahili which is her native tongue.

Sister Maria Remedios teaches sewing to the novices and postulants and is responsible for the sewing department as well as for house maintenance.

The novices and postulants also have

an important share in the housework outside their time of prayer, lessons and study. They do cooking, cleaning, gardening, laundry, animal care, sewing, some carpentry and house painting. In addition to all this, they go to the open market in pairs on Saturdays to buy fresh fruit and vegetables.

The Novitiate has been unfortunate with its vegetable garden this year because of a drought lasting five months. If they had had a bore-hole their vegetables would have prospered. In Kenya the ground becomes hard and very dry if it does not rain for few days and then after some weeks the grass turns brown. It is quite interesting to know that the water in Karen is as deep as 350 meters below the surface—no wonder there is such a scarcity of water! The fact that the Council water comes only twice a week means that the novitiate has no other choice but to buy water and refrain from watering the garden.

The whole community also has some moments of relaxation. Every day the sisters go for a walk after lunch for about half an hour, and on second Wednesdays, the novices and postulants go for a long walk for the whole afternoon. On the last Wednesday of the month the whole community goes out for a picnic at a green park where they spend most of the day in innocent games, not forgetting, of course,

to pray the Divine office at noon and performing the prescribed thirty minutes of spiritual reading after lunch.

Building Projects

Finally, after eleven months of intense building work between June 2011 and May 2012, the members of Our Lady of Angels House are settled in their renovated house. For this they are sincerely grateful to the Divine Providence and to their Superiors and benefactors. In return, the whole Novitiate pray daily for their intentions at the altar and during the recitation of the Holy Rosary. May Almighty God reward them! $\boldsymbol{\Omega}$

Historic Moments

Early 2012 marked a new step forward in the history of our congregation. Starting with the Feast of the Epiphany and after a preparatory retreat of eight days, Fr. Thomas O.P. clothed three postulants with the holy habit of our order (Sr. Mary Louise, Sr. Mary Johanna and Sr. Mary Thomas), donned four novices with the black professed veil (Sr. Mary Raymond O.P., Sr. Maria Lucia O.P., Sr. Mary Jacinta O.P and Sr. Mary Anthony O.P.), and placed the bridal ring on one beaming, finally professed sister - Sr. Marie Therese O.P.

It was not only the biggest ceremony we have ever had, but also one of the last for New Zealand, for not long after, in fulfilling what seems to be God's will, our Mother General, along with Sr. Catherine O.P., Sr. Mary Raymond O.P. and the new novices and postulants, headed for their new home in Tynong, Australia, leaving a community of nine professed sisters in Wanganui, New Zealand. It was an emotional day for all; sad that we would be separated, yet conscious of the fact that growth is a great blessing. Already the sacrifices seem to be producing fruit as five postulants have sought admittance and young ladies from various countries have expressed interest in visiting and discerning their vocation. The big

step now is to build a big Motherhouse to house all the sisters.

Plans for the future include setting up a Catholic tertiary course so that postulants and novices can receive a good spiritual formation and yet still come out with an internationally recognised qualification towards teaching. This will eventually lead to the setting-up of a Catholic University so our young girls coming from the secondary level can be trained in various fields within a good Catholic environ-

ment. But to do this, we need your help. Please pray for our congregation - if you can help us financially, God bless you - if you can send us vocations, all the better. There is much work to do! And if you are still discerning, there is always the opportunity of coming to New Zealand to help out for a year doing the cooking, laundry and perhaps a little teaching before committing to a formal postulancy in the beautiful country of Australia. Easter Newsletter 2012

Dear Friends and benefactors,

The fourth Rosary Crusade is almost at a close. It began last Easter and will end this year at Pentecost. Time is short and the current situation between Rome and the SSPX has reached a critical point. Since the meeting on 16th March 2012, with Cardinal William Levada, Prefect of the Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith, Bishop Bernard Fellay, Superior General of the Society of St. Pius X, has urgently been inviting the faithful to redouble their fervour in prayer and their generosity in making sacrifices during these Holy Days of Lent and in the weeks that will follow the solemnity of Easter, that the Divine Will may be done, and it

alone, after the example of Our Lord Jesus Christ in the Garden of Olives: non mea voluntas, sed tua fiat (Luke 22:42).

So important is this decision that he has to make, that it could either make or break the SSPX's fight for the survival of Tradition within the Roman Catholic Church. His Lordship Bishop Fellay is very aware of the gravity of this decision; for this reason he is calling upon all faithful to help him. His words of urgent request are the following, "May the faithful be so kind as to offer one holy communion for this intention. May they make fully their own, in thought and in deed, the prayer that Our Lord asked us to address to our heavenly Father: "Sanctificetur nomen tuum, adveniat regnum tuum, fiat voluntas tua sicut in caelo et in terra; hallowed be Thy name, Thy kingdom come, Thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven!"

The Rosary Crusade is proving to be more indispensable than ever. This is why the Society of St. Pius X, which wants only the good of the Church and the salvation of souls, turns with confidence to the Blessed Virgin Mary, so that she might obtain from her divine Son the lights necessary to know His will clearly and to carry it out courageously.

It is worthwhile having a look in hind-sight at the fourth Rosary Crusades of the SSPX. You will find an interesting résumé further on in this letter from Fr de Cacqueray, District Superior of France. Upon reading this summary you will be struck by both the generosity of the contributing faithful and the rapid answer of heaven to

Recent Events

Our priory enjoyed visits of many priests passing through on holidays, and spending some relaxing time with us. Due to the happy visit of Fr. Anthony Van Wingerden currently stationed in England, for the first time in history three NZ born SSPX priests, Fr. Lavin, Fr. Wingerden and myself, dined together at our priory. Perhaps Providence might arrange for the event to be repeated next year, with the addition of Fr. James Peek (now a professor at Winona, U.S.A.) to complete the quartet!

Parish Missions

St Anthony's Parish, Wanganui and Immaculate Heart Chapel, Avondale both enjoyed the great grace of a parish mission preached by Fr Alphonsus Marie, CSSR. There has not been a Redemptorist parish mission in New Zealand for over 12 years, which meant we were well overdue. A great attendance was seen in both places. Avondale faithful gathered to the tune of 80 a day, keeping Fr Marie Alphonsus busy in the confessional from noon till late hearing 42 general confession. Wanganui was not to be outdone. 240 members of the parish attended 3 hours of talks, prayers and instructions daily for the whole five days, and caged Fr. Alphonsus Marie in the confessional for days on end as he heard 121 general confessions! Well done New Zealand, you started your Lent well this year!

CIA Camp, December 2011

The CIA (Catholic Youth Association) held its bi-annual camp, for young adults attached to Tradition. The camp was held in Cambridge near Hamilton and was the occasion for young adults from all over the North Island to assemble for four days of instruction on the perennial philosophy of St Thomas Aquinas, and the false philosophers of the Modernist crisis. Many new friendships and contacts were gained as well as the unforgettable experience of a night trip by canoe up the narrow chasms of a glow-worm studded river gorge (ous!). The next camp will be held this coming June, keep your eyes peeled for details at your nearest local SSPX Mass centre.

St Anthony's Parish Gala

I must extend my heartfelt gratitude to the many faithful throughout NZ who contributed so many items – from garden tools and kitchen appliances to pianos for this year's annual Gala. The Gala was a huge success, raising just over \$10,000. The number and quality of stalls were

outstanding, giving St Anthony's Parish the reputation of one of the best Galas in town. Other schools looked upon us with envy when they saw the support and initiative of the parents and families of our school. Such support is not seen in any state school.

Storm Damage and Burglary

Only last October our Avondale Mass centre in Auckland was hit by a tornado which damaged the roofing, fencing and wall of our buildings and property there. In March, 2012 our parish and schools in Wanganui suffered similar losses. However during February the boy's school was burgled losing over \$5000 worth of computer and electronic equipment. The school is poor and in much need of these items, so the loss was a real sacrifice for the boys and a small headache for the

principal. But we thank God that only material objects were at stake and not souls or lives. Only two weeks later the parish, like much of the lower North island was hit by gale force winds of up to 150km/hr. The damage to our property and buildings was minor, but resulted in another \$5000 repairs to roofing, fencing and exterior cladding. Again we thank God that only material losses were endured.

Farewells and Welcomes

Our priestly community has been experiencing a few mutations since last January. In late January Fr. Anderson was transferred to Brisbane Australia where he now serves the SSPX parish of Brisbane as parish priest. His replacement, Fr. Louis Bochkoltz, finally arrived in March. He is a young priest originally from Belgium and ordained in 2009. He has served the Society of St Pius X in four districts in the space of 3 years, being first sent to Belgium then to Africa, then to Australia, afterwards onto Singapore and finally to

New Zealand. He will be assisting me in parish work, accounts and the important mission we occupy in New Caledonia.

Fr Fortin, who has been serving the Traditional faithful of New Zealand for the last three years, has been assigned to Manila, Philippines where he will swap jobs with Fr. Robert MacPherson and be be placed in charge of the first boarding school in that country. We are most grateful to him for the great work that he has accomplished as priest in charge of the Auckland Mass Centre, teacher of Catholic Doctrine in the boys' school and spiritual director of the Children of Mary and several Third Orders. He will be greatly missed by all.

As Fr Fortin's replacement, Fr. MacPherson will be joining us in June, God willing when he obtains his visa. Originally from Canada, he spent much time as professor at the SSPX seminary in the USA. From there he was transferred to St Mary's Academy Kansas where he taught for many years at the high school. He was asked in 2010 to found the first boarding school in the Philippines. He succeeded in establishing an excellent foundation for further growth, but wastroubled by the heavy heat of tropics (his favourite sport is ice hockey). He has been transferred to New Zealand where we hope the climate will treat him more kindly. We anticipate his arrival sometime this June.

The dreariness of Lent and the drama of the Passion are now past. Christ is risen and now awaits our conversion to Him. The objective redemption is achieved; all that remains is our subjective redemption. This is not an exercise in "becoming conscious that we are automatically saved," but a love story that ends in death—death to self, death to the world. May we receive of the treasury of grace won for us by our Lord in His Passion through the hands of His and our Mother.

TRADITIONAL CATHOLIC SCHOOLS : A CONDITION *SINE QUA NON* OF A CATHOLIC EDUCATION

FOR PARENTS

The primary end of marriage is the procreation and education of children. This means that the highest consideration (and often the greatest cause of worry) for Catholic spouses is to give their children a Catholic education.

Options for Education

There are usually five options for education: Public (State) School, Modern Catholic School, Conservative Protestant School, Home School and Traditional Catholic School. The table shows the general advantages and disadvantages of each, but the advantages of traditional Catholic schools require elaboration lest the reader is not convinced.

Advantages of Traditional Catholic Schools

Contact Time

Children who attend a traditional Catholic day school have at least 35 hours of direct or indirect contact time with their religion each week outside the home through both their teachers, which usually include priests, brothers and sisters, and their environment. If they do not attend a traditional Catholic school, the contact time would be the duration of Sunday Mass and perhaps a short catechism class - say two hours maximum per week.

The same applies to mothers and fathers. Their involvement with their school is time well spent for their own spiritual welfare.

Catholic Friends and Community

A traditional Catholic school associated with a parish or Mass Centre forms the nucleus of a Catholic community so that children and parents can support each other in the Faith. Both children and parents have Catholic friends close at hand. Experience has shown that wherever there is a well-run traditional Catholic school, there is a thriving Catholic community.

Vocations

In the Society of St. Pius X, the overwhelming majority of vocations now come from our schools. Considering the arguments presented above, how could it be otherwise? Father William Doyle S.J. (+1916) quotes fellow Jesuit, Fr. Leonard Lessius S.J. (+1623), in his treatise on vocations:

If a gardener were to plant a precious seed, requiring great care, in stony ground, covered with thorns; if he exposed it to the rays of the sun and every change of climate to try would it grow in that unfavourable

spot, who would not look upon him as a fool? Those who advise people called to religious life to remain, for a while, in the world have even less sense. A vocation is a divine fruit for eternal life. It is planted in the human heart, a soil little suited to its nature, and requires great care and attention.

Where better than a traditional Catholic school to find that great care and attention in the frequent reception of the sacraments, religious instruction and the cultivation of virtue.

THE MAGISTERIUM OF THE CHURCH

In its pre-conciliar magisterium, the Church gives clear guidance on the type of school Catholic parents should find for their children. The magnificent encyclical of Pope Pius XI written in 1929, *Divini Illius Magistri* on the Catholic education of youth, is well worth reading for any parent. [N.B. It would seem prudent

to avoid the Second Vatican Council Declaration on Christian Education, *Gravissimum Educationis*, because it is ambiguous at best and seems to be at odds with *Divini Illius Magistri* at worst].

Education Must Be Integrally Catholic

Catholic education must be integral. In every subject of study, the students need to see the connection between God and the natural order of things.


§80. The mere fact that a school gives some religious instruction, often extremely stinted, does not bring it into accord with the rights [and duties] of the Church and of the Christian family. To be this, it is necessary that all the teachers, syllabi and textbooks in every branch, be regulated by the Christian spirit, under the direction and maternal supervision of the Church; so that religion may be in very truth the foundation and crown of the youth's entire training; and this is in every grade of school, not only the elementary, but the intermediate and the higher institutions of learning as well.

Against Naturalism And A False Notion Of Freedom


§60. Hence every form of pedagogic naturalism which in any way excludes or weakens supernatural Christian formation in the teaching of youth, is false. Every method of education founded, wholly or in part, on the denial or forgetfulness of original sin and of grace, and relying on the sole powers of human nature, is unsound. Such, generally speaking, are those modern systems bearing various names which appeal to a pretended self-government and unrestrained freedom on the part of the child, and which diminish or even suppress the teacher's authority and action, attributing to the child an exclusive primacy of initiative, and an activity independent of any higher law, natural or divine, in the work of his education.

Against Sex Education

§65. Far too common is the error of those who with dangerous assurance and under an ugly term propagate a so-called sex education, falsely imagining

they can forearm youth against the dangers of sensuality by means purely natural, such as a foolhardy initiation and precautionary instruction for all indiscriminately, even in public; and, worse still, by exposing them at an early age to the occasions, in order to accustom them, so it is argued, and as it were, to harden them against such dangers.

Against Co-Education

§68. False also and harmful to Christian education is the so-called method of 'co-education.' This, too, by many of its supporters, is founded upon naturalism and the denial of original sin; but by all, upon a deplorable confusion of ideas that mistakes a leveling promiscuity and equality, for the legitimate association of the sexes. The Creator has ordained and disposed perfect union of the sexes only in matrimony, and, with varying degrees of contact, in the family and in society.

Against Non-Catholic Schools

§79. From this it follows that the so-called 'neutral' or 'lay' school, from which religion is excluded, is contrary to the fundamental principles of

education. Such a school, moreover, cannot exist in practice; it is bound to become irreligious.

Conclusion

It would be fair to say that the traditional teaching of the Church (which is not "time-conditioned" because it has the natural state of man with original sin as its object) leaves no room for doubt that, unless parents are able to overcome the difficulties of homeschooling, they must send their children to traditional Catholic schools if they are to fulfill their duties as parents.

Traditional Catholic schools require more commitment from parents, they are difficult to run for priests and religious; they require huge amounts of energy and are usually a black hole for money, but they are the condition *sine qua non* of the long term survival and flourishing of any parish. Without access to a traditional Catholic school, a parish or Mass Centre will grow with difficulty and even risks becoming stagnant and decreasing.

May God grant us priests, teachers and plenty of children for our schools. May Catholic parents receive the grace to love their children enough to make the sacrifices necessary for their Catholic education. May our heavenly Mother, our *Sedes Sapientiae*, hold our schools in her tender care. Ω
